DIRECTOR'S STATEMENT

Since our revolution is still an emerging one that hasn't solidified yet either politically or even in our souls, as a filmmaker, I wanted to make a film with multiple stories and character lines without a single spoken dialogue, leaving the events and the images to clarify themselves, giving myself —before the audience —a chance to contemplate and absorb the events that, without exaggeration, changed my life forever along with many Egyptians.

In a lot of the scenes, I often depend on presenting the major event before or after dialogue between characters begins or ends, leaving the audience –myself included- a chance to contemplate the event, always remembering what Sufi Sheikh Neffari said: "I only speak so you can see... If you see, no need to talk".

As tragic events evolved during the first days of the revolution, some I witnessed myself, I found myself drowning in Sufi studies from Al-Hallaj to Ibn Al-Farid and many others, and I became fascinated by Egyptian Sufi chanting which constitutes another line in this film. For that reason Sufi songs and chants were excluded from the "dialogue-ban", but instead relying on the poetry of these chants as food for thought.

During the sit-in in Tahrir Square, I personally volunteered at what was known as the "Media Camp" which is a tent built in the square to collect footage from mobile phones and cameras of the protestors and revolutionaries, while other volunteers archived and organized the footage before sending them to international stations when communications were cut across the country. This is how I got to spend weeks reviewing diverse footage that shows a range of events from brutal violence to absolute joy, all taken by regular people who have their very special and personal ways of storytelling.

I can personally say that this is how I saw and knew stories of the revolution. This gathered material that was sent to TV stations all over the world was also the way people of the world found out what Jan25 means, and that's why I found myself spontaneously drawn to the idea of using similar filming techniques, long takes and handheld camcorders with a style close to amateur videos on the internet, including all the defects and disadvantages of cheap digital cameras and video compression on the internet. So we intentionally use these defects to create a new visual style of storytelling that carries us to a time and place away from the conventional style.

There is also a main goal which is making the audience a part of the event, just like how the videographer was a part of the revolution and how his presence with the camera often made a change to the flow of events as we learned from all the footage we saw. I also think it's important to emphasize the role of the handheld camera in this film, focusing on materializing it into a simple style that does not break the solid aesthetic concepts of cinema which we'd like to keep.

In the end, Rags & Tatters—a term that refers to a type of Sufi chanting competition improvising wisdom poetry- is a film that I'm making for myself, to contemplate where I've been and where I'm going. Thinking about the revolution not as a political concept that we'll keep discussing as long as we live, but as a concept that goes beyond our human tragedy to hope in salvation of our souls in this difficult world.
